Day 29 of 30 DAYS & 30 WAYS of keeping the love affair with plastic at

bay. The biggie - **DRINK BOTTLES**, where to start. It takes up to 3-7 ltrs of water & 1 ltr of oil to produce 1 ltr of bottled water. When Australia was first introduced to bottled water in the late 1980s, we all thought it was a joke. Us Aussies would never be so foolish as to buy bottled water. Well, the joke is on us! In a triumph of

marketing over reason we are buying bottled water in droves! The average Australian drinks 30 ltrs of bottled water per year. Australians buy more than 118,000 tonnes of plastic drink bottles a year. More info at:

Day 28 of 30 DAYS & 30 WAYS to take a breather from plastic. Wash cloths and sponges - we all use them, but many are synthetic. These cheap sponges are cotton, absorb 20 X weight in water and replace synthetic sponges and paper towel and they come in plastic free packaging.

Day 27 of 30 DAYS & 30 WAYS to tear yourself away from plastic — it's hard I know. How about trying a bread bag? Made from up to 10 recycled plastic bottles, large size so they will fit most loaves or 6 bread rolls. The bags are BPA Free and freezer safe so you can minimise waste by freezing your bread. They have a double lining to help prevent freezer burn. With a roll and clip closure, you can simply roll down the closure. https://www.floraandfauna.com.au/onya-reusable-bread-bag-aqua

Day 26 of 30 DAYS & 30 WAYS to imagine life with less plastic. Buy a bamboo utensil pack or make your own, leave it in the car or your bag ready for you next impromptu take away meal.

Day 25 of 30 DAYS & 30 WAYS to live without plastic. Pegs have mostly been plastic so how about trying Stainless Steel pegs. Introducing, the one-piece stainless steel peg or "wire peg" that will last a lifetime. These pegs aren't only great for the washing. They are handy paper clips, for bunting, clips in the garden, hanging photographs, and so much more. below contains:

- 2 stainless steel cups or try a keep cup or thermo cup
- **2 containers** (protects snacks squishing everywhere you go)
- 1 cutlery wrap (with knife, fork & spoon)
- **5 cloth bags** (for all the extra things)
- 1 water bottle (refill at airport, anywhere & everywhere)
- 1 tea towel

Day 21 of 30 DAYS & 30 WAYS to live plastic free. Went to a baby shower today and the gift of the day were the new, modern, easy clean cloth nappies by My Little Gumnut: https://mylittlegumnut.com.au/collections/modern-cloth-nappies It takes around 400 years for each disposable nappy to completely decompose in landfill. That means EVERY disposable nappy ever used (and its contents) are still out there somewhere — yuck! By using just 1 reusable nappy per day, you will reduce the amount of disposables in landfill by around 900. Even when taking into consideration the manufacturing and laundering of MCN's, the environmental impact is still significantly less. Modern Cloth Nappies are made to last, which means they can be used for your first and subsequent babies. Thus, they will have a

very long life before they eventually make it into landfill (use old MCN's as rags in the shed before throwing them away - try doing that with a disposable!). The natural materials used in the manufacturing of will also break down a lot quicker than disposables.

Day 20 of 30 DAYS & 30 WAYS to live plastic free. At best only 20% of plastic in Australia is recycled. Prepare - have that **keep cup** & **shopping bag** & set of **utensils** packed in your car ready to go. #waronwaste

Day 18 of 30 DAYS & 30 WAYS to live plastic free. Keep cup, way better than a take-away cup any day. The local pharmacy in Stawell sells keep cups that are completely biodegradable. Ask for more eco-friendly products - Fiona will be there to serve you - don't forget to mention Project Platypus

Day 17 30 DAYS & 30 WAYS to live plastic free. Be like Helga. Helga is an eco-warrior, walking the talk, buying locally and living plastic free. At Newton's Butchers, Stawell, Victtoria Helga buys wax-covered cheese and brings in her own containers to butcher and canvas bag to avoid plastic. Helga has heaps of tips and will be at our Plastic Free July Party, July 31st. Check out our event page for more information.

Day 16 of 30 DAYS & 30 WAYS to live plastic free. Instead of shiny plastic wrap for gifts (especially at Christmas), use a recycled scarf or piece of material and try Japanese **Furoshiki**.

Day 15 30 DAYS & 30 WAYS to live plastic free with big picture thinking - Australian research and incentives to reduce and recycle waste are a feature of the below article. The process of burning waste to create energy means that recyclable materials are lost forever as renewable resources. This isn't the ideal way to look at materials – metals can be repurposed, and many plastics can be reformed and reused a number of times. A team of researchers at the Centre for Sustainable Materials, Research and Technology (SMaRT), at University of New South Wales

have developed a range of technologies to reform waste into valuable materials to be

used in existing and new manufacturing

Day 14 of 30 DAYS & 30 WAYS to live plastic free. I have had Onya **produce bags** for several years and can highly recommend them. The bags are made from recycled plastic drink bottles, weigh 10 grams each, lightweight and strong, each bag can carry up to 2 kilos, measure 30 cm wide x 25 cm and have a draw string tie. Day 13 of 30 WAYS & 30 DAYS to live plastic free. CAPE TULIP

Wimmera CMA status: Regionally controlled

Glenelg-Hopkins CMA status: Regionally controlled

Distribution notes: Mainly found in the Pomonal, Dadswells Bridge, Concongella and Black Range area, infestations are often found or originate from old house sites as it was once planted as an ornamental garden plant. Underground bulbs and prolific seed production make it difficult to kill and eradicate infestations once established.

Seed viability: < 2 years

Time to reproductive maturity: 2 + years

Control options: Isolated plants can be dug out by hand but be sure to get all of the bulbs as there may be more than one for each plant. Spraying is possible from August up until flowers start to die off in October when plants are actively growing. Metsulfuron Methyl 600g/kg at a rate of 15g + penetrant (Consume, Pulse etc.) + dye per 100 litres of spray mix has proven to be very effective. Glyphosate 450g/kg at a rate of 1 litre per 100 litres of spray mix is also effective but will kill surrounding grasses and other plants.



Bridal Creeper (Asparagus asparagoides)

Wimmera CMA status: Restricted

Glenelg-Hopkins CMA status: Restricted

Distribution notes: Found right across the upper Wimmera, Bridal Creeper was once

planted in gardens for it attractive foliage. A real problem environmental weed able to invade areas of native vegetation without the need of soil disturbance (fire or machinery baring the soil) for it to become established. Birds carry the seeds after eating the fruit and excrete them out in their droppings, plants are usually found under trees or a fence line where birds have perched. Underground rhizomes (bulbs) make it difficult to kill with herbicide often requiring a number of years of sequential control.

Seed viability in soil: < 10 years / rhizomes < 5 years

Time to reproductive maturity: 3 + years

Control options: Isolated plants can be dug up and the rhizomes left on the soil surface to dry out in warmer weather. The foliage dies off in early summer, reshooting in May – June with the autumn rain. Plants can therefore be difficult to locate once the foliage has died off. Metsulfuron Methyl 600g/kg at a rate of 15g + penetrant (Consume, Pulse etc) + dye per 100 litres of spray mix has proven to be very effective over many years of control work by Project Platypus. Glyphosate can also be used but does not seem to be as effective at killing the rhizomes under the ground. Repeat spraying may be necessary in subsequent years as some rhizomes lay dormant each year and produce foliage a year or two later.

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
